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

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

Director's Notes



For a long time, opera companies did not perform American musicals. We were firmly rooted in the traditions of European opera and eventually operas from the Americas and other parts of the world. But Golden Age Broadway musicals were written for classicallytrained voices, performed without amplification. The same cannot be said of most new Broadway musicals. As a result, opera companies now celebrate these works and more often keep these classics alive.

Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II epitomize Broadway's Golden Age, ushering it in with *Oklahoma!* in 1943. Next followed *Carousel* in 1945, which according to his autobiography *Musical Stages*, was Rodgers' favorite. In its "Best of the Century" list, *Time* magazine dubbed *Carousel* as the Best Musical of the 20th Century. Its life and death themes are dramatic, and its songs are sophisticated and tuneful.

Carousel, like most works, reflects the time in which it was written, which can lead to modern day challenges. In the story, Billy Bigelow hits his wife in a fit of rage. Mrs. Mullin, owner of the carousel, urges Billy to leave his wife Julie Jordan for "a good livin" of young girls and beer. Billy later commits suicide after a botched robbery attempt. These are heavy issues that may seem more operatic than the song-and-dance of many musicals.

For tonight's program, I have decided to omit most of the dramatic conflict. Rather, tonight we celebrate the brilliance of Rodgers' music and Hammerstein's lyrics. The score is filled with one hit tune after another; many will be familiar to you. The action takes place somewhere on the New England coast at a time not really so long ago. These songs reflect their circumstances, good and bad. They also remain in our ears and hearts and hopefully always will.

Lauren Nash Silberstein (Julie Jordon) is delighted to make her FCO debut. Lauren most recently debuted the role of Gilda in *Rigoletto* with The Druid City Opera, joined Union Avenue Opera for their summer season, was the recipient of both the Joy B. Misenhimer Encouragement Award from the Mendelssohn Club Vocal Competition and The Bedřich Smetana Award from the International Czech and Slovak Competition. Some favorites recently performed include Margot Bonvalet in *The Desert Song* and Lisette in *La rondine* with Winter Opera St Louis and Kathie in *The Student Prince* with The Ohio Light



Opera. Lauren holds a master's degree from The Eastman School of Music.



Steve Valenzuela (Billy Bigelow) has performed standard and contemporary opera, musical theater, concert and oratorio work, as well as a few stints in commercial acting. He appeared with First Coast Opera recently as Marcello in *La Boheme*. He has performed with many nationally recognized opera companies including Opera Project Columbus, Shreveport Opera, Utah Opera, Utah Festival Opera, and Florentine Opera, including the title role in *Don Giovanni*, Conte Almaviva and Figaro in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Marcello in *La Bohème*, Samuel in *Un*

Ballo in Maschera, Howard in David T. Little's *Dog Days,* and Sam in *Trouble in Tahiti.* He received his Master of Music degree from Louisiana State University and his Bachelor of Music from Western Connecticut State University.

Gloria Palermo (Nettie Fowler) is thrilled to be making her debut with First Coast Opera. Gloria is originally from Cocoa, Florida and currently based in Tampa. In 2023 Gloria completed her Artist Diploma at the University of Colorado Boulder. In addition to performing, Gloria is a dedicated and passionate voice teacher across all genres of singing. She holds a Master's in



Music from the University of Southern California and a Bachelor's in Music from Rice University, and has received additional training at the Santa Fe Opera, Tanglewood Music Festival, and the Aspen Music Festival.



Omar Najmi (Enoch Snow) is based in Boston, MA. Upcoming engagements include *Adoration* with Los Angeles Opera, *Mozart in the Museum* with Anchorage Opera, *Carousel* with Boston Lyric Opera, and *Messiah* with Boston Baroque. As a composer, Omar is a current member of Washington National Opera's American Opera Initiative, where his and Christine Evans' opera *Mud Girl* will be premiered in January. He has additionally had works commissioned by Atlanta

Opera, Boston Lyric Opera, White Snake Projects, Juventas New Music Ensemble, and Emmanuel Music.

Wyatt Matlock (Townsman) Wyatt is thrilled to be back with First Coast Opera! He has been doing shows with First Coast since 2017. Wyatt was born and raised here in St. Augustine. He began his career by singing in choirs, playing piano, and doing musical theatre camp! Wyatt attended the Florida School of the Arts before transferring to Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Musical Theater.



Some of his theater credits include Les Misérables, Ragtime, Bye Bye Birdie, Seussical the Musical, Father of the Bride, The Courage to Write a Woman's Wrongs, and Company! Wyatt works at Old Town Trolley here in St. Augustine as the Lead History Teller! Last season he led performances of his original one-act opera, *The Stranger's Tale*, in Saint Augustine, Jacksonville, and Mount Dora.





Pianist **Keith Teepen**, enjoys a multi-faceted career in performing and teaching. Keith has performed in Europe, Asia, South America, and throughout North America.
